Post 16 opportunities for young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) in Hillingdon

This brochure has been made for young people with SEND, by young people with SEND, to help you understand the options available after the age of 16.















What can I do after school?

When finishing Year 11, all young people are required to be in some form of education or training up until the age of 18.

There are lots of options available to you. You may choose to go to sixth form at a mainstream school, stay on at sixth form at a special school, apply to college, or try an apprenticeship or supported internship.

This leaflet provides more details on options for tailored programmes and support services aimed at nurturing individual strengths and guiding students towards fulfilling independent futures.

Processes for Education Health Care Plans (EHCP) post 16

- 1. We recommend you start looking at post 16 options the year before you are moving on, so you have plenty of time to visit colleges or settings and understand what they can offer as they are each different and have their own qualities.
- 2. When you find somewhere you like, enrol with the college and tell your EHC Coordinator so that they can send a consultation (this means we send your paperwork to the college), but you also need to apply online directly with the college or provider.





- 3. We will need to know your preferences by October of your final year in your current setting. This is earlier than young people without an EHCP, as we need to prepare the paperwork to make sure the right support is put in place for your placement, and we will let you know your placement by 31 March.
- 4. If you change your mind after October, we can still make your application, but we do need to work towards the 31 March deadline. If you don't meet the deadline, tell your EHC Coordinator, apply directly and we can still support you.

You should expect to receive tailored careers advice from your school or college, and your EHC Coordinator can also tell you about options available. For impartial advice and support, you can contact SENDIASS by emailing sendiass@hillingdon.gov.uk or calling 01895 277001.

If things don't go to plan, contact the SEND EHCP Team and we can discuss your options. You may need to have entry requirements for a specific course, but sometimes you can enter at a lower level. SEND EHCP Team will support you to find a different placement if needed.

Why is the process different because I have an EHCP?

The EHCP will tell people at your education setting what you need to help you with learning, and having an EHCP means it must be put in place.

Will my EHCP carry on when I'm in college?

Yes, if it is still necessary and you continue to make progress.

Will my EHCP carry on until I'm 25?

An EHCP can continue until the year you turn 25 but wont always. There are reasons a plan can be ceased, including:

- it is no longer necessary to maintain the EHCP
- you no longer need the support listed in the EHCP
- you no longer wish to carry on in education or training
- the council is no longer responsible for the young person



- you have gone into paid work (not including apprenticeship)
- you have started a higher education course, university or other Level 4 course
- you are over 18 and no longer wish to engage in further education
- you are aged 25
- you no longer live in Hillingdon (your new local authority will be responsible for your EHCP).



Do I have to reapply every year?

No, you do not have to reapply every year for your EHCP. If you want to stay at your college once you have finished your course, you should tell your college and they will advise what you need to do, but every college is different. The SEND EHCP Team might ask what your plans are, and it is important to let us know.

The SEND EHCP Team is available to support you and please do not be afraid to contact your EHC Co-ordinator who will be able to signpost to further services or advice.

Sixth form and further education

If you choose to study at Uxbridge College, your study programme will include your main qualification, English language, and maths (if you have not gained a minimum of grade 4 in each subject), tutorials and individual support, work experience, enrichment activities and skills to help you become career ready.

I progressed through Entry 2, Entry 3 and Level 1. I then joined the Supported Internship programme at the Sheraton and now at the age of 25 I am in paid employment."

Inclusive learning

Foundation Learning and Skills for Life courses at Uxbridge College are suitable for students who have less or no formal qualifications and would like to progress onto a vocational course in the future. They are suitable for people with special needs.

Students study employability, maths and English, as well as learning various skills, such as IT and customer service.

Friendly staff provide a supportive and caring environment to help students reach their potential goals and progress to further study or employment.

One young person said: "I finished mainstream school at the end of Year 11 and completed a foundation course, and as a result I am now progressing to Level 3 business."

Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships are for young people over the age of 16 and combine studying with gaining skills and knowledge in a specific job. During the apprenticeship programme, you will be required to spend a minimum of 30 hours onthe-job training that includes:

- core knowledge modules learning through a combination of online learning and practical classroom workshops
- Level 2 English and maths
- a work-based portfolio to demonstrate the skills you have learnt at work-related projects
- an assessment at the end.

Supported internships

There are three different supported internships in Uxbridge at Hillingdon Hospital, the council's Civic Centre, the Pavilions shopping centre and two at Heathrow, at the Sheraton and Marriott hotels.

Each internship has a dedicated transition programme known as Project SEARCH, which offers interns the chance to do work experience in different rotations over multiple 10 week periods to gain experience, learn new skills and increase their confidence to find a full-time job that suits them.



Job coaching

Throughout your internship, you will be allocated a job coach who will support you to learn the rotation tasks. This could involve supporting you to settle into the workplace, breaking down the task, writing visual instructions, or helping with emails. As you become more confident and independent in the tasks, the job coach support will fade out.

After the supported internship, the job coach can provide job-searching support for an additional 10 months which can help you through the application process, including support with creating your CV and cover letter. You can ask for the interview questions to be given to you beforehand, so the job coach can support you to prepare the answers. They can also come to the interview with you to help you gain confidence.

- **2.** The college will contact you with next steps.
- If successful, you will be invited to an interview.
- **4.** You will attend the assessment day and visit the site to be interviewed.
- **5.** The college will arrange a date for the start of term.

Your options

Work experience

Work experience helps you gain practical skills and learn about the business while working for an employer on-site. This allows you to get more of an understanding of how the business operates and what is expected of you. It allows you to carry out some of the tasks that a paid member of staff would do daily.

This allows you to get more of an understanding of the type of career you would like to go into, as well as being able to experience what day-to-day working life is like. Also, work experience is a good way of finding out about a new business if you are looking to change careers.

Meet our interns

Many young people with SEND who have successfully completed an internship at the council's Civic Centre in Uxbridge or at Hillingdon Hospital have gone on to gain full-time employment or a higher-level apprenticeship.

Jobs that young people have gone onto include techincal administration, a customer service assistant or a role in the local library.

Ben, a supported intern at Hillingdon Council

"My current rotation department is a library assistant at Uxbridge Library! I had numerous

responsibilities at the library including shelving books, providing support with events such as reading books to children, and shredding paper from old books.



"Project SEARCH offers

three different rotations at the council, and training such as interview skills and gaining a qualification Level 2 for getting ready for work. You can gain confidence, skills and learn the different aspects of a working environment.

"It has helped improve my confidence massively as well as allowing me to learn new skills, meet new people, try things that I have never done before and more."

"I work in the facilities team, and I previously worked in the brokerage team. I prefer the facilities team because I prefer more practical work and more hands-on



work. It allows you to see what you are good at before going into full-time employment.

"We have two job coaches helping us write applications and work on our CVs."

Interns at the Marriott Hotel

We spoke to several interns about the work they are doing in the Project SEARCH transition to work programme at the Marriott Hotel in Heathrow. They said: "An internship is for students that have special needs, and it helps special needs people to understand what it is like to work in the workplace to get a job.

"You can work in the lounge, help to clean items, work in the canteen, plus different types of rotation include engineering, housekeeping and working at the hotel's pool

facilities. You also get certain benefits, such as getting a free lunch every day and attend work events and job fairs.

"You could gain knowledge on how different businesses



work and you get to work in different teams. You could gain more confidence because you are surrounded by different types of people that you get to work with daily."

"You are supported by a job coach who helps with the work that is being done and helps you look for work. This helps with confidence."

Further support

Hillingdon Autistic Care and Support (HACS) is a charity that supports autistic adults and young people and those with special educational needs. It helps



young people to gain full-time employment with supported internships, support to complete CVs, and advice with job applications.

HACS offer various services, such as family support, training and events, skills and employment, adult support, autism hub and also help with mentoring to develop your skills and confidence. They also offer vocational courses in partnership with colleges, workrelated benefits support, in needed work support through access to work, travel training and training for employers.

Our local offer provides information for children and young people with SEND and their parents/ carers. It allows families to see what they can expect from a range of local agencies and how to access them.
