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s we commence a new municipal year, whilst the next 12 months will once again be as challenging for local authorities as the last few years, I am pleased to be able to report that here in Hillingdon it will very much be business as usual. There will be no facility closures or service cuts, indeed in many areas there will be new and improved facilities and services.

Once again we ended the last financial year with a budget surplus and our approach of strong leadership, sound financial management and transforming how we work will continue, so that we are well placed to deal with the financial challenges that still lay ahead of us.

There is much debate at the moment about the detrimental effects of poor air quality in London and other areas and why this needs to be addressed now in a realistic and positive manner. With summer just around the corner, we will once again be bringing a whole host of events for residents. Our Culture Bite arts and literature festival will be extended to offer a full-year programme of themed sessions and activities. Manor Farm will hold an animal fun day, with a range of farm animals being brought onto the site and opportunities to learn how the site operated in Tudor times. The council will commemorate the 75th anniversary of the D-Day Normandy landings in June with a four-day schedule of special tours, lectures, a film screening and family activities. Our Bikespiration cycling event will expand its format to go on tour around the borough, and our Hayes Community Family Fun Day and popular Family Fishing Days will both return in July and August. These all promise to be great days out for all ages and I would encourage you to go along and see what they have on offer.

May I conclude by saying thank you to the staff of Hillingdon Council. We are fortunate to have some of the best staff in local government in Hillingdon in both frontline and support services who, by and large, do an excellent job enabling us to continue to put our residents first.

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## Claims denied as planning permission for site is refused

The council has denied claims that it agreed a masterplan with Meyer Homes for the Master Brewer site near the A40, and has welcomed a decision by the Mayor of London in March to allow the council to refuse planning permission.

Whilst there was constructive dialogue with the applicant, M B Hillingdon Ltd (Meyer Homes) when a planning application was first lodged in September 2017, the company ceased negotiations in late 2018 and instead pursued a scheme which was heavily criticised at the council's Planning Committee on Tuesday 19 February 2019.

The council's biggest concerns were the overall scale of the proposed development, its height and lack of landscaping. Concerns were also raised that the scheme was unduly intrusive, failed to respect the established character of the local area, did not complement the street scene or openness of the local green belt, and would mar the skyline.

Despite this, Meyer Homes was reported on the local My London news website as having "worked with the council to formulate a residential lead master plan [sic] for this key development site in Hillingdon."

Cllr Keith Burrows, **Cabinet Member** for Planning, Transportation and

**Recycling**, said: "We have not had any meaningful contact with Meyer Homes for some time and have not formulated or agreed a master plan with them. In fact, we decided to refuse them planning permission on the site for no less than 10 reasons, including unacceptable overdevelopment."

As is normal procedure with any scheme of more than 150 units (or 15,000 square metres) the council was legally required to refer its planning decision to the Greater London Authority (GLA) to review. The council received

confirmation from the GLA on Tuesday 19 March that the Mayor of London has allowed the council to refuse the planning application.

**Cllr Burrows** added: "We welcome the London Mayor's decision to support our refusal for this massive overdevelopment. Whilst we recognise the need for affordable housing, we will always defend our residents against poor quality and inappropriate development proposals."

The 2.99 hectare vacant plot is the former site of the demolished Master Brewer Motel and public house. It is situated between the A40 Western Avenue to the north and Freezeland Way to the south.



Residents will get a chance to have their say on workin-progress designs for the Colne Valley Viaduct, which is set to become one of the most prominent features of the High Speed Rail 2 (HS2) route.

HS2 will dissect the north of the borough, running in tunnel through Ruislip and emerging above ground at West Ruislip Golf Course. From there it will run at surface level, crossing Breakspear Road South and Harvil Road. The track will then rise to cross the Colne Valley on what will be one of the longest viaducts in the UK.

The council's preferred method for crossing the Colne Valley was via a tunnel. However, the HS2 Select Committee decided to place cost savings ahead of the environment and community protection - something the council challenged.

As an approving authority for the design of the viaduct for the part that runs through Hillingdon, and, as with all HS2 applications, we will be giving residents the opportunity to have their say via an online consultation on our website once the designs have been formally submitted (expected this summer).

The consultation responses will then be reported to the council's Planning Committee, which will make the final decision.

The designers are also expected to hold engagement events in May, which residents are encouraged to attend. These will be listed on the HS2 website: hs2inhillingdon. commonplace.is.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "The HS2 project is without doubt an unnecessary waste of public money and in my opinion should, and may well be, abandoned. However. for the moment we must engage in damage limitations. The Colne Valley Viaduct will be one of the longest viaducts in the whole country and will cross a landscape of immeasurable importance and elegance. A tunnel makes more sense, but if we have to have a viaduct,

it must be fitting. So, it is vital we get the views of residents on the designs in order to form a consensus."

The council has started the process of seeking a judicial review against the Secretaries of State for Transport and Housing, Communities and Local Government's decision on Monday 4 March 2019 to unlawfúlly overrule part of a planning inspector's recommendation.

The inspector heard an appeal from HS2 Ltd in July 2018 against a refusal by the council's Planning Committee to allow its application under the HS2 Act 2017 for an ecological mitigation scheme in relation to land in the Colne Valley at Harvil Road, Harefield.

## Hillingdon Carers awarded



Hillingdon Carers - a charity part-funded by the council that provides information, advice and health and wellbeing support services to unpaid carers - has been awarded a Level Two Quality Mark by the National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCVO).

The award means that Hillingdon Carers now holds the Trusted Charity Mark, a designation providing external verification of the quality and credibility of the organisation.

To achieve the top award, Hillingdon Carers was assessed against 11 criteria and successfully met them all. The panel of assessors particularly noted the organisation's strong financial management, and how the charity works well with other organisations.

Hillingdon Carers leads a partnership of five charities including the Alzheimer's Society, Hillingdon Mind, Carers Trust Thames, and Harlington Hospice. They have simplified how to find services for Hillingdon's carers, who now only have to tell their story once to access more than 50 different services. The partners even share staff, delivering many projects jointly with significant cost saving advantages.

Known as the Hillingdon Carers Partnership, the group of charities have come together to improve support for carers in Hillingdon. They are mainly funded by the council.

The Trusted Charity standard exists to build public trust and confidence in individual charities, the difference they make, and the sector as a whole.



More than 4,000 year 6 schoolchildren from 58 Hillingdon primary schools attended our annual Junior Citizens event between Monday 4 and Friday 22 March, the largest attendance this programme has seen since it began more than 20 years ago.
This council-funded

scheme took place in Brunel University's STEM centre and included 10 different workshops led by various organisations, including the council, the Royal National Lifeboat Institution, London Fire Brigade, Metropolitan Police, Transport for London, NHS, and the Life

Education team. The programme's aim is to educate young people who are making the transition from primary school to secondary school. The young people were given information in a fun and interactive way, and were reminded that their newly found independence will come with great responsibility. Topics included firé, internet, water

and travel safety: knife crime and drugs and alcohol.

Julia Brooker, who teaches at St Helen's **College,** said: "I think this is a really good event for young people, as it shows that they need to have more awareness especially when they go out on their own. An informative part of the event was the fire safety workshop, as it highlighted the dangers of seemingly safe activities. They showed the consequences of charging your phone under a pillow and had a model of the melted items to show the children the damage this could cause."

## High Court backs council's bid to protect public land from illegal encampments

The council has successfully applied for a High Court injunction that prohibits illegal encampments on more than 350 sites across the borough and makes it easier to remove people who ignore it.

Although the injunction, granted by the court on Friday 29 March 2019, refers to 'persons unknown', people from the travelling community are most likely to be affected by it.

The injunction forbids caravans, mobile homes, vans and lorries from coming onto 358 specific sites for the purpose of

occupying it or depositing waste. It also prohibits any person - whether travelling onto the land in a vehicle or not - from fly-tipping there.

The list of restricted sites includes 290 parks and green spaces, along with leisure facilities, public car parks and car parks attached to public buildings, such as libraries and theatres.

There have been 41 land incursions in the borough since January 2018, leading to clean-up costs of approximately £200,000.

The council anticipates that the injunction will act as a significant deterrent, while

ensuring the quick removal of Providing the injunction those who ignore it.

Hillingdon Council is believed to be the first local authority in west London to have secured such an injunction. It will mean that neither the council nor the police will have to rely on their respective powers under the Criminal Justice and Public Order Act 1994, which is not always quick and effective at removing incursions and encampments.

The injunction will initially remain in force until Tuesday 18 June, on which date the council will return to the High Court.

is working effectively in practice, the council will ask the court to extend it for a three-year period.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot,

said: "I am very pleased that we have obtained this injunction, which protects a significant number of valuable sites in the borough. A great deal of our time and money is spent each year in dealing with incursions and encampments and these resources can now instead be used for the direct benefit of our residents."

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## Local RAF group attends a special bunker tour



The Battle of Britain Bunker Exhibition and Visitor Centre hosted a special reception for the RAF Fighter Command's newly reformed No.11 Group on Thursday 4 April.

The original No.11 Group were co-ordinated from the bunker's Operations Room throughout the Second World War, where they received information about enemy squadrons that had been sighted. Commands were then sent out to the airfields to scramble RAF planes during the Battle of Britain.

Guests at the reception included the then Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr John Morgan; Air Vice-Marshal lan Duguid, who is Chief of Staff Operations at RAF High Wycombe; and also No. 11 Group's Air Officer Commanding, Squadron Leader Andrew Kerslake and 40 service personnel from the current No. 11 Group.

Attendees toured the bunker, where they heard about its history, including No. 11 Group's significant role and contribution leading up to and during the Normandy landings in 1944. A wreath was later laid at the bunker's memorial, before the group listened to a talk led by Dr Rachael Abbiss, the centre's Military History Curator.

Air Vice-Marshal lan Duguid, said: "As we approach the six month anniversary of the reformation of [No. 11 Group] - what an excellent opportunity in acknowledging its magnificent history in the defence of the United Kingdom. This visit gives us an excellent opportunity to learn from the RAF personnel that went before us under the 11 Group crest... we can recognise the achievements, through the sacrifice and the dedication of those personnel in 1940 and their part in defending our nation."

## New lease of life for Harefield Village pond

Renovation works to Harefield Village pond have been completed, following an investment of £145,000 from the council.

The idyllic pond sits in the south-east corner of the village green, which is a Green Flag awardwinning site. To retain this accreditation, all aspects of the village green, including the pond, have to be maintained to a high standard.

The pond is of both ecological and historical importance - the green has been registered as a common since 1813. Renovation work was required to ensure its longevity as a premier heritage feature in Harefield.

In recent years the pond had dried out during the summer months due to leakages in its gravel bed foundations. Growing vegetation, particularly reeds, had become invasive and overgrown. This vegetation covered

nearly half of the pond to the detriment of the water quality.

The works were supported by local residents and ward councillors, who expressed a preference for more visible water to attract ducks and other water birds. To minimise the impact on existing wildlife, works were carried out during the winter period when wildlife activity is at its lowest and completed in April.

The pond now has a new liner and edging, which is seeded to provide a grass edge with the water. The concrete edging to the adjacent war memorial has also been retained. New roadside drains have been installed to prevent oils and pollutants being washed into the pond with rainwater. Waterlilies have also been positioned centrally in the pond; this is the only plant life added and it will help reduce the risk from further invasive species.



Help us to identify Hillingdon's heroés

The council has plans to create a wall of remembrance at Jubilee Walk in Dowding Park, Uxbridge, and is looking for assistance from residents to identify veterans' names for inclusion on it.

The wall will recognise

servicemen and women who were born or lived in Hillingdon and died in any conflict since the end of the Second World War, that is, on or after 1 January 1948,

(or in Palestine from 1945 to

1947). The memorial will continue to commemorate Armed Forces personnel currently serving who

die in action. Submissions need to include the name, rank, service number, date of death and age of the veteran. Candidates can be nominated online on www.hillingdon.gov.uk/ rollofhonour.

said: "In Hillingdon, we are extremely proud to support the Arméd Forces and ensure that our service men and women's commitment is recognised. The memorial wall will ensure that we, and generations to come, remember the great sacrifices made by military service personnel from Hillingdon."

# Every pupil in the borough offered a school place

We have once again ensured that every child in the borough has a primary and secondary school place.

The council processed 3,903 primary school applications this year. In April, 97.88 per cent of applicants were offered a place at one of their top three schools and 89.37 per cent were offered their first preference.

Earlier in March, 86.8 per cent of applicants were offered a place at one of their top three preferred

secondary schools and 67 per cent received their top preference.

Despite receiving a record high of 3,916

secondary applications this year, Hillingdon is again above the London average and remains the top borough in west London for families receiving an offer at one of their preferred secondary schools

# Drone no-fly zone extended in Hillingdon

Residents are being reminded that in response to a marked increase in the number of drone-related incidents most of the borough is now designated a drone no-fly zone.

In recent years there has been a rise in drone use for recreational and commercial purposes and significant travel disruption was caused in December 2018 and January 2019 following drone sightings at both Heathrow and Gatwick airports, raising substantial safety concerns.

In response to this, the government amended the UK Air Navigation Order to introduce new airspace around airports March. This is of particular relevance for Hillingdon, with flight zones expanded around Heathrow Airport, RAF Northolt and Denham Aerodrome - covering 74.4 per cent of the borough. The regulations make it illegal to fly any drone (including model aircraft and toys) within 5km of any airport at any time within these no-fly zones (unless Air Traffic Control or the

airport itself has given permission).

In areas outside of the no fly-zones, existing Civil Aviation Authority rules still apply for recreational and commercial drone use. These state that it is illegal to fly above 400 feet or 50 meters away from people and property and 150 metres away from crowds and congested or built up areas. Residents need to be vigilant and ensure that if they are responsibly flying a drone from the unrestricted zone that it doesn't fly into the no-fly zone.

The map (below) provides a guide to the no-fly zones but to take a closer look and view all guidance on drone regulations, visit dronesafe.uk.

The council's Parks and Public Spaces Protection Order also prohibits the use of remote controlled vehicles and aircraft in all of the borough's parks without consent from the council. People found to be flouting this can be issued with a fixed penalty notice of £100.

## 'Most complained about' dealer sentenced for fraud

in London".

A car dealer who admitted fraud has been sentenced at Isleworth Crown Court following an investigation by the council's trading standards team.

Appearing at the court on 20 February 2019, Mohammed Ósman Khan, director of London Car Autos Ltd of Park View Road, Uxbridge, was given a 16-month prison term, suspended for 18 months, and ordered to complete 225 hours of unpaid community service. He was also disqualified from being a company director for five years and must pay £32,537 in compensation and £8,000 costs.

Khan, aged 25, whose car sales business traded as both Heathrow Motors and Stockley Trade Centre, had pleaded guilty to fraudulent trading at an earlier hearing.

His offences, which occurred between 1 March 2015 and 16 November 2016, included

misdescribing vehicles, lying about the number of previous owners, failing to register or transfer warranties and not making it clear to customers the identity of the business.

During 2015 and 2016, the council received more than 50 complaints about the company via the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline, making it one of the most complained about traders in Hillingdon.

Cllr Douglas Mills. **Cabinet Member for** Community, Commerce and Regeneration, said:

"The complaints levelled at the business about selling unroadworthy vehicles were particularly serious and could have resulted in motorists coming to harm. So, it's only right that Khan has been brought to justice for his offences.

## London Motor Museum named for failing to pay business rates The council has expressed

its disappointment with London Motor Museum of Hayes, which has failed to pay more than £600,000 in business rates over the past Trustees Limited. 12 years.

The unpaid rates relate to premises previously occupied by the museum in Nestles Avenue and Viveash Close.

The organisation has repeatedly changed its name, using four subtle variants of London Motor Museum', but has carried out the same business with the same directors.

The council has taken recovery action for more than a decade, obtaining various liability orders at the magistrates' court. However, council enforcement agents have been unable to remove and sell the museum's cars because they are owned

by another company - Elo

In addition, the museum has gone into voluntary liquidation on four occasions, most recently in April of last year, meaning the council, which is considered a nonpreferential creditor, has been expect us to be putting unable to collect the debt.

Although occasional payments have been made, thé council has been forced to write off business rates to the value of £646,319.

Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Cabinet Member for Finance, Property and Business Services, said: "London Motor Museum has been operating under slightly different names since 2007, yet it has paid very little in the way of business rates. This makes a mockery

of the system and is an insult to all the legitimate and law-abiding companies that pay their rates on time and contribute positively to our local economy. It also shows a lack of regard for our residents, who money into services. We will not hesitate to use all legal options to recover the outstanding business rates." Despite these difficulties,

the council had one of the best business rates collection rates in London last year, collecting 99.2 per cent of what companies owed - equating to £394 million. With a collectable debit of £404 million for 2018/19, the council is on course for a record collection of 99.3 per cent.

## Alcohol funding success

Public Health England (PHE) has given the council funding for a series of measures aimed at helping residents with alcohol problems.

The £69,660 will go towards a fibroscan machine - a type of ultrasound that can rapidly detect liver disease.

The machine will be used by Addiction Recovery Community Hillingdon (ARCH) at their facilities in Uxbridge.

The funding will also cover the refurbishment of a welfare room at ARCH where homeless and rough sleeping residents who are alcohol dependent can access computers.

Hillingdon is one of 23 local authorities across the country to receive a grant from PHE's £6 million fund for drug and alcohol treatment projects.

## Reduction in homelessness

The number of households becoming homeless in the borough has reduced as a result of the council's residentfirst approach to tackling homelessness.

The council has helped to reduce the number of homeless households living in emergency temporary accommodation, with numbers dropping by almost a third

between March 2017 and January 2019.

Help includes providing support to individuals, families and landlords early on, well before evictions or the threat of homelessness has reached crisis point. The approach is to prevent families from entering emergency temporary accommodation in the first place, and help those families already there

into alternative settled accommodation.

One part of the council's homeless prevention strategy is working with reputable private sector landlords offering settled accommodation, acting as a broker to match them with tenants and agreeing rents that are affordable for the duration of a tenancy. Once people are settled in private accommodation, the council continues its relationship with the family and landlord, helping to

maintain tenancies should difficulties occur. Cllr Philip Corthorne,

Cabinet Member for

Social Services, Housing, Health and Wellbeing, said: "Moving households out of expensive temporary accommodation makes sound financial sense and is also best for families. We also address the issues that led to homelessness in the first place and provide ongoing support to ensure residents do not become homeless again."

## Many happy returns from our Home Library Service

The council's free Home Library Service travels the length and breadth of Hillingdon to visit residents who would otherwise be unable to access a library.

he service reaches people who are housebound, including those living in residential homes and sheltered housing developments.

From books in standard or large print and audio books on CD or MP3, to magazines and DVDs, registered members can borrow a wide range of library materials every four weeks. Library staff hand deliver the items on Mondays, Tuesdays or Wednesdays, depending on where residents live in the borough.

Since it launched more than 30 years ago, the service has provided a huge range of reading and learning materials to older residents, including avid reader **Esther Salter** (pictured right). Esther lives in Northwood and has been a regular user of the Home Library Service for the past 14 years.

In March, Esther celebrated her 100th birthday and she still enjoys receiving a different book every four weeks. She said: "I'm currently reading Happy Birthday by Danielle Steel and *Death comes to* Pemberley by PD James. This service is a lifeline to me – I love my books and really appreciate the visit."

# Be aware of unexpected callers at your home



Instances of fraud are frequently happening in local streets in the UK, with cold callers approaching households and offering to do unnecessary work to people's homes.

The council is urging residents, particularly older people, to be extra vigilant and guard themselves and their neighbours against rogue traders.

Fraudulent cold callers will sometimes initially offer to carry out a small job, such as clearing rubbish, repairing roof tiles, gardening, or cleaning, for a very low price before falsely claiming that a lot more work needs to be done. Some fraudsters may gain your trust by pretending to work for another resident in your street, using glossy flyers, or wearing smart suits or safety helmets to deceive you.

If you are visited by someone who says they are from a water, gas or electricity company, or from the council, check their ID card thoroughly. You can also call the company's customer services department to confirm whether it is a genuine visit.

If an unexpected cold caller offers to carry out any home maintenance

work, do not feel pressured into signing any form of agreement or saying yes to having work done there and then. If you are interested in the service that the trader is offering, take down their details so you can check their credentials through an approval scheme, such as www. buywithconfidence.gov.uk, The Age UK Business Directory www.aubdlondon.co.uk or www.checkatrade.com, or speak with a friend or family member for advice

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "Rogue traders can be very believable and persuasive but don't be rushed into making any rash decisions. Take control of the situation and listen to your instincts."

If you encounter a suspicious tradesperson, please note down details of the company name, the people and their vehicle, and call the Citizens Advice service on 03454 04 05 06. The council's trading standards service will investigate and take appropriate action

Some of his favourite events have been hosting gatherings in the Mayor's Parlour – and he's loved some of the questions he's been asked by schoolchildren, cadets and scouting groups. Cllr Morgan explains that every day has been varied and the year has been full of memorable engagements. The council would like to encourage residents to support those living with dementia to make individuals, and their carers, feel supported to remain independent and have choice and control over their lives.

#### **Dementia Action Week**

As well as running our regular Dementia Friends' coffee mornings, magic table sessions in libraries and information drop-ins, so residents can register as Dementia Friends, we are also trying something new to help more people to 'take action.' We are training retailers in Uxbridge during this year's awareness week. The council will lead sessions at the Pavilions shopping centre for employees from a range of stores, who have pledged to become more dementia friendly.

It is hoped that those who are trained can pass on their learning to colleagues, and if the scheme proves successful, the council hopes that other retailers in Ruislip, Hayes, Northwood and West Drayton high streets may also make the pledge and then extend training throughout the borough.

We are also supported in our efforts this year by intu shopping centre, Uxbridge, which last month started to pilot an assisted shopping service for residents living with dementia. Every Tuesday there will be three, two hourly slots between 10am and 4pm, where customers will be supported by an intu staff member for the duration of their shop. For more information on how to book this service, contact intu Customer Service on 01895 819 400.

Decathlon, based in the centre, has also donated a space in their store and use of some of their products to the council to run one of its seated exercise classes during the Action Week.

#### Younger onset group

In February, the council started a new weekly meetup session for residents living with dementia aged under 65.

The group meets each Thursday between 10am and 11.30am at Northwood Library, offering sessions alternating between reminiscence and gentle yoga. Attendees will also have the chance to shape future activities.

This new session meets the needs of residents who said they felt disconnected from the existing dementia coffee mornings, which were more focused on older residents.

In March, we introduced some new activity resources for people living with dementia at each of our dementia coffee morning libraries.

The special Active Minds kits will be used at the coffee mornings that don't use the magic tables (Tovertafels) and are also available for residents to use at any time.

There is one kit per library, containing various activities, such as jigsaws, cards to play snap, water painting sheets, a marble track maze game and fidget widget. The resource pack provides stimulation for people living with dementia and benefits include, improving dexterity, increasing engagement and encouraging conversation.

#### Special film screenings

The Beck Theatre in Hayes launched dementia-friendly film screenings on Monday 11 March, with support from the council.

Every second month, residents living with dementia and their family or carers are invited to come along to watch a film in a safe and relaxed environment.

Cinemas are places where people can reconnect with memories. For the screenings, the theatre leaves the house lights on, sound levels are lowered and residents are able to sing, talk or move around during the film. This, as well as clear signage and staff, who have all been trained as Dementia Friends and on hand to help, creates a safe and comfortable surrounding for attendees.

The first film was Stan and Ollie. More than 40 residents attended with time built in at the end to have free tea, coffee and biscuits and to chat about the film.

The council helped with advice and training and offered 30 free places to the first screening to regular Dementia Friend coffee morning attendees.

# **Transforming your** town centres

The council continues to invest in the borough's town and village centres, ensuring they remain attractive places to live, visit and work. *Hillingdon People* brings the latest news from Ruislip, Hayes, Uxbridge and Eastcote.

#### Ruislip

An exciting new venture is underway in Ruislip where the council has taken up the temporary lease of an empty shop at 72 High Street and made it available for community use.

Local organisations, groups, individuals and businesses have been invited to come forward with suggestions for the shop, which is next door to the Edinburgh Woollen Mill.

Whether it's used for leisure activities, meetings or events - the council is open to suggestions. If one particular idea takes off, consideration will be given to make the facility permanent.

The front part of the shop is earmarked to host a small retail space for two, three or four start-up traders to display their goods. The middle section has large tables for meetings and talks and a big map and consultation boards to prompt a discussion about the future use of the shop. The back of the unit has a fully functioning kitchen that can be used to host food events.

The council is also promoting the space to residents who use Manor Farm Library, with the potential of the venue hosting literary events, 'knit and natter' sessions or events for young residents who may not typically go to the library.

Meanwhile, also in Ruislip, the council has started inviting shops in the high street to apply for its flagship shop front grant scheme, which has already benefited 227 small businesses across the borough.

Successful applicants will have 80 per cent of the cost of shop front

improvements, such as new signs, awnings, refurbishments and minor repairs, covered, as well as access to professional design expertise.

The scheme is widely regarded as a practical and economical way of attracting new customers and boosting business, while improving the look and feel of an area for residents and visitors.

The regeneration of the Hayes Parades, extending from Lidl to Lansbury Drive, is now complete. The £2.5 million project, which has seen new street lighting, seats, benches, bins and paving, has drawn positive comments from residents. with a recent survey garnering 560 responses, a large proportion of

which were extremely positive. One resident said: "A huge improvement - from shabby to smart with a coordinated look and feel along the whole length of the improvements. Thank you!"

Recipients of the shop front grant in Kingshill Avenue and Hayes End Parade are currently having their new signage designed.

#### Uxbridge

Bakers Yard has been given colourful new bin storage units, which brighten the area up considerably, and the installation of new street lighting, trees, seating and paving near The Pavilions shopping centre has been completed.

Residents might also have noticed work progressing on the former Randalls store site, where Inland Homes is building new flats.

There are also plans for new paving, benches, trees and flowerbeds between Vine Street and the Civic Centre, and there will be changes to the road layout to allow vehicles to turn around more easily near the Civic Centre. Work is expected to get underway later this year.

The council also plans to improve the bus stop in Vine Street.

#### **Eastcote**

The shop front grant scheme has been extended to other businesses in the high street and a project to improve Eastcote bridge is set to be completed this spring, with work currently being done to install new street lighting and fencing.

The planting of a 'rain garden' - an attractive and eco-friendly area that uses plants and shrubs to improve drainage and prevent surface water flooding during particularly heavy rainfall - is also scheduled to be completed in May.

# Our trailblazing apprentices



We marked National Apprenticeship Week in March with a special event at the Civic Centre in Uxbridge to celebrate the invaluable contribution that apprentices of all ages bring to the council and its services for residents.

Cllr Richard Lewis, **Cabinet Member for** Central Services, Culture and Heritage, who addressed

apprentices at the event, said: "A little over two years ago we only had six apprentices within the whole council. But we made a conscious decision to invest in our apprenticeships scheme, spending £293,000 in apprenticeship training alone. Now we stand as one of only six London boroughs to meet the government's apprenticeship targets last year - a feat we are incredibly proud of. And we are set to exceed the targets again this year."

ore than 70 apprentices from a wide range of departments gathered in the Council Chamber on Tuesday 5 March to share their experiences and receive thanks from the council's leadership.

The event also gave attendees the opportunity to network and see presentations from external companies who work with apprentices.

The council runs one of the most successful apprenticeship schemes in the country, having increased its number of apprentices tenfold since the government introduced its Apprenticeship Levy in April 2017.

Since then, the council has employed 51 additional apprentices and used its apprenticeship scheme to train 76 existing members of staff.

The high calibre of apprentices has led to seven people being offered a permanent role within the council.

The scheme gives apprentices the real-world experience and training they need to gain qualifications and forge a career, while also being paid and working towards an accreditation.

Apprentices work in a variety of roles across the council, including business administration, licensing, housing and horticulture.

The council will not recruit to a new role or fill a vacancy until that position has been considered as a potential apprenticeship opportunity.

#### **Emma Hanmore, 23**

Emma is a Level 5 Human Resources (HR) apprentice. After completing her traditional studies and working in a nursery, her dad suggested she consider a career in HR.

She said: "As I looked into HR, I found myself falling in love with the role, and directed all my efforts into moving into the industry."

After applying for HR roles all across the UK, Emma successfully applied for a Level 3 HR support apprenticeship at the council. She immediately impressed her managers, quickly progressing through her apprenticeship levels, and is hoping to become one of the first to do a Level 7 HR apprenticeship, followed by a

Emma was awarded the Crosby Management Training Sue Thompson Memorial Award for HR 2019, recognising exceptional apprentices.

#### Paul Alexander, 56

Paul currently manages a team of business performance analysts while studying for a degree in data analysis with Bucks New University.

After working as a clerk for the Northern Ireland Housing Executive, he moved to London and got a job as a temp in a bank in the City.

He said: "Twenty years later, after having enormous amounts of fun, it was time for a career change and I moved into local government as a homelessness outreach worker. After a while I moved into performance and business intelligence.

"Having the opportunity to learn something directly related to my professional life, and to be supported by my employer in that, is incredible fun."

## **Update from the West Area BCU Superintendent**

So far, 2019 has been a busy year, and whichever newspapers you read or social media channels you follow, knife crime has never been far from the front pages.

Here in Hillingdon we have been focusing a huge collective effort into tackling this issue and I'm proud to say we have seen a 24.5 per cent reduction in incidents of 'Knife Crime with Injury' over the last year.

Our 'Interceptor Units' – a team of experienced officers, with access to high powered vehicles and a network of ANPR cameras, have made more than 150 arrests, and carried out just under 300 stop and searches since January.

In addition, Operation Wolverine, the West Area's elite tasking team continues to be deployed into crime hotspots and have played a key part in

the reductions seen in the 'Knife Crime with Injury' figures.

Since the Wolverines were formed they've made more than 300 arrests and have carried out nearly 1,000 stop and searches. Search #OpWolverine on the @MPSHillingdon Twitter account to find out more about the work of this team.

Looking ahead to the next six months, we're excited to be welcoming 175 new police officers who are being posted to the West Area. This well-needed injection of additional officers will be a huge benefit to all.

Lastly, I would encourage anyone who has not yet signed up to OWL (Online Watch Link) to do so, and join the 34,000 people across Hillingdon, Hounslow and Ealing who already benefit from this fantastic online Neighbourhood Watch system. Visit www.owl. *co.uk/met* to find out more.

# National Lottery support for Cranford Park

A bid for National Lottery funding will be made by the council in February 2020 to support the development phase of a major restoration project at Cranford Park in the Crane Valley. This follows an initial funding bid in December 2017 that secured £221,100 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and Community Fund.

ranford Park is a beautiful country park, with woodland, riverside walks, gardens, orchards, meadows and a stable yard. The council is working alongside the Cranford Park Friends and other local groups to restore the park to its former glory.

If the February 2020 bid is successful, work will begin later that year on restoration of the park's historic buildings and landscape. Additionally, new visitor facilities will be added and a programme of visitor and volunteer activities put in place.

Cranford Park was once a fine country estate, owned from 1618 to 1918 by the Berkeley family, who built the house and laid out its park. Cranford House, the Berkeley's main residence, was demolished in 1944. The 144 acre (58 hectares) park still features several historical relics including a walled garden, a grade two listed 18th century stable block, an ice house and a ha-ha - the name given to a carefully constructed walled recess in the ground that creates a barrier to animals without interrupting the view.

The 18th century vaulted brick cellars, which have lain unseen since the Berkeley's servants worked there, will be opened up to the public for the first time. The cellars and the foundations of the old house, currently hidden behind railings, will be home to a new café, meeting room, toilets and exhibition space.



These facilities will be reached by the old grand driveway which will also be restored. The café will overlook the area that was once the Berkeley's private gardens with the restored ha-ha.

In addition to the restoration works there are plans for a new circular cycling and running track, a footpath network with heritage and nature trails, playgrounds and car parking. All restoration works will be planned and undertaken with the utmost care.

Between Saturday 27 April and Saturday 18 May there were exhibitions and events in the park and the surrounding area. These explained the proposals in more detail and asked for residents' opinions on the restoration works.

Cllr Jonathan Bianco, Cabinet Member for Finance, Property and Business Services, said: "It was wonderful to receive this initial grant to help us in our plans to preserve this important historical site. This is a much-loved green space and these new and improved facilities will further enrich our visitors' experiences.

"There will also be opportunities for volunteers to learn new skills, such as restoring the Victorian fruit wall in the kitchen garden, maintaining the orchard or working on the annual community archaeological excavation. Exciting family events are also being planned."



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


