

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spend record amounts on road resurfacing, maintain a free to use weekly refuse and recycling collection, have the best parks and open spaces in the UK for five consecutive years, improve and retain our library service, as well as building and expanding primary and secondary schools and supporting our older residents with initiatives such as free burglar alarms. Venus and Cupid return

A historical statue of Venus and Cupid that was nearly destroyed during a fire in Cranford Park in 2014 has been restored to its former glory, thanks to a heritage project commissioned by the council.

The marble figure, which is believed to date back to the 18th century, was initially thought to be irreparable after being reduced to burned fragments. However, as the statue is an important part of the history of Cranford and believed to have inspired the legend of the Grey Lady ghost, the council wanted to preserve it for future generations to view.

Following a remarkable restoration by Cliveden Conservation, it has been returned to Hillingdon and given a temporary new home in Botwell Green Library, where it is on display for al¹ to enjoy. The council plans to return it to Cranford Park once lottery-funded restoration works at the park are complete.

Restoration proved to be a challenging process of painstakingly cataloging, analysing and cleaning all

the pieces, before re-assembling and setting them using stainless steel dowel pins and polyester resin. The team was even able to remodel some parts of the figure that were so badly damaged that they couldn't be saved, including

Cupid's nose. However, as Venus had lost her nose prior to the fire, a decision was made in the interests of authenticity not to remodel it.

The restoration has now become a huge part of the statue's history and another important chapter in the survival of Cranford Park.

Step-free access news welcomed



Transport for London (TfL) has announced that Ickenham and Ruislip tube stations are set to go step-free by spring 2022.

The news has been welcomed by the council, which has long campaigned for a step-free borough.

The work, which includes installing new lifts, will be funded by TfL and will improve the accessibility of the Tube, making life easier for the elderly, disabled, carers and parents with young children.

The full opening of the Elizabeth line in 2019 will also provide more accessibility, with every station along the route, including Hayes and Harlington and West Drayton, being step-free.

Cllr Keith Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, said:

"Two thirds of Hillingdon's 15 underground stations are currently inaccessible to wheelchair users, so it's great news that Ickenham and Ruislip will soon be step-free. We will continue to campaign for a step-free borough, where all residents have equal access to public transport."

As well as having an increasingly step-free Tube, London has the most accessible bus fleet in the world, with all 9,000 buses low-floor wheelchair accessible and fitted with ramps. Hillingdon Council was one of the first boroughs in the capital to achieve TfL's bus stop accessibility target of 95 per cent fully accessible. The project involved council transport officers assessing every bus stop and making changes where required.



New minibus for local cadets

Council funding has provided 1381 (West Drayton and Yiewsley) Squadron with a brand new minibus.

Cllr David Simmonds, Cabinet Member for Education and Children's Services, handed over the keys for the brand new 16-seater vehicle in February to Dejan (Dan) Mihailovic, Wing Commander of Middlesex, who accepted the vehicle on behalf of the squadron.

The Royal Air Force Air Cadets group previously used an old and tired minibus for transport, so the upgrade is a welcome resource,

which will be used for the cadets' training; civic events and parades; annual camp; educational visits and activities; including flying, road marching, canoeing, abseiling, drill competitions and aero-modelling.

Flight Lieutenant Robert Glynn at 1381 Squadron, said: "We're delighted with our new minibus, as it means we can continue to provide activities away from the unit to young people in West Drayton. On behalf of all the staff and cadets at 1381, I would like to thank Hillingdon Council for their support."

New waste and recycling facility

A planning application was submitted by the council for a new waste and recycling facility on part of the old coal yard site off Tavistock Road, West Drayton in February.

As well as providing a household waste and recycling service for residents, the facility will also accept controlled amounts of trade waste, which will be particularly beneficial to local small businesses.

The application was expected to go before the council's Major Applications Planning Committee in May and if approved, the council will look to quickly expand use of the facility to daily use this summer. Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "Residents and businesses in the south of the borough have long been calling for a waste and recycling facility in their area, especially since the closure of the West London Waste site in South Ruislip.

"We have been offering a waste weekend every month at Tavistock Road since 2009, which has been extremely well received. However, it is clear that it needs to be a permanent facility. Therefore, we have taken immediate steps to ensure that it is up and running as soon as possible. "Many positive benefits will arise from our plans, including an overall reduction in boroughwide traffic and associated air quality issues, and a

likely reduction in fly-tipping."

The council is keen to stress that the planning application is no comparison whatsoever to the very large scale waste transfer and recycling facility refused planning permission in 2016 for the former coal yard site. The new use will only occur during normal daytime hours, between 8am and 6pm, Mondays to Fridays and 9am to 5pm on Saturdays, Sundays and Bank/Public Holidays (subject to seasonal variation).

New homes for local residents

A brand new development, which will provide 13 affordable homes for local people, was opened by the council on Tuesday 20 March.

Poppy Close, which was named in tribute how we are taking action to to the former British Legion site, off Station Road in West Drayton, was bought by the council in September 2017 from local

developer Peter Kearns to help meet the need for affordable rented housing.

The high quality, modern townhouses offer kitchens with integrated appliances, three bedrooms, ceramic flooring at ground level and in the bathroom, and each home has its own garden and allocated parking space.

Cllr Philip Corthorne, Cabinet Member for Social Services, Housing, Health and Wellbeing, said: "Like many other local authorities, Hillingdon is

facing a high demand for affordable housing and these homes demonstrate ensure there are good quality properties for people in housing need."

Every pupil in Hillingdon offered a school place

Hillingdon has once again ensured that every child in the borough has a primary and secondary school place.

Despite high levels of demand for places, 95.1 per cent of pupils received one of their preferred secondary school choices, with 88 per cent of applicants receiving one of their top three schools. Hillingdon remains the top borough in west London for families receiving an offer at one of their preferred secondary schools.

Hillingdon also topped the list in west London for families receiving an offer at their first preference primary school, with 98.6 per cent of applicants receiving an offer at one of their preferred primary schools.

Cllr David Simmonds, Cabinet Member for Education and Children's Services, said: "Once again, we are delighted to announce that every child in the borough has been offered a school place and are pleased that so many of our local children received their preferred choice.

"To meet the growing demand for school places in the borough, we are continuing to invest in our school building and expansion programme, one of the largest in London, to provide additional primary and secondary school places. Éducation is a priority for the council and academic attainment for children and young people in Hillingdon continues to be very positive." For more information visit www.

Social housing for residents in need

The council continues to ensure that social housing is allocated to residents in genuine need of permanent accommodation and regularly inspects all properties that are council-owned.

Since March 2011, the council has saved $\pounds 6.5$ million by recovering 366 properties from residents who no longer need them or from those who have illegally sublet their rented home to other people.

Last year the council initiated an inspection on each of its 488 bungalows. The properties are purpose-built for older residents and people with disabilities, and include assisted bathrooms and TeleCareLine technology.

The council visited each bungalow and identified 11 properties that had been left unoccupied but it was still paying housing benefit for. Residents had either moved out of the area to live elsewhere, moved in with other family members or had moved into care homes without notifying the council.

Once the homes had been recovered, the council was able to re-let the bungalows to residents in need of social housing; whether homeless, elderly, or those unable to

rent in the private sector, saving the council £198,000. The council is encouraging

residents in social housing to notify

officers of any changes to their circumstance and to cancel housing benefit claims when no longer needed by calling 01895 556666.

Families in social housing who are able to downsize are also offered incentives, such as help with moving to free up larger properties for other residents.

Cllr Philip Corthorne, Cabinet Member for Social Services, Housing, Health and Wellbeing, said: "We regularly monitor our properties to ensure that homes are allocated to those residents who need them the most. The council has a strict local policy criteria, which includes continuous residence in Hillingdon for a minimum of 10 years, and will react quickly to any reports of tenancy fraud."

New visitors' audio guide



A brand new audio guide was launched during Easter weekend at Manor Farm with an afternoon of activities for residents and visitors.

Members of the public were invited to complete the 40 minute tour and experience the highlights of the heritage site. The trail, which begins at Ruislip High Street, takes visitors on a journey through more than 1,000 years of history at eight different locations.

Children hunted for chocolate treats in the library; poetry writing workshops took place in the Great Barn and the Ruislip-North West

Middlesex Brownies and Girl Guides held a crafts workshop of drawing and egg decorating. The Herga Band also entertained visitors with live music. Harmit Bhamra, a teacher at Warrender Primary School, said: "We've all (teachers and pupils) learnt a lot from the guide and found it very interesting."

Borough tops London safest road list

Hillingdon is the safest London borough to drive in for every mile driven according to Department for Transport (DfT) data.

Research shows that drivers in Hillingdon are the least likely to be involved in a car accident in the capital. The borough has the lowest number of crashes in London per 100 million miles driven, with just 48 accidents.

Data for 2016 showed that motorists in Hillingdon drove 1,356 million miles and there were only 649 accidents.

On average, London boroughs experience 166 crashes per 100 million miles, and Camden (292), Hackney (309), Islington (313) and City of London (383) ranked worst in terms of safety, with many more accidents per miles driven. In comparison, according to the DfT, you're five times more likely to have an accident in those boroughs than in Hillingdon.

Hillingdon also has the lowest number of accidents resulting in serious injury or death, with just five per 100 million miles. In comparison, Westminster, Camden, Islington, Hackney and City of London are the least safe, with between 32 and 53 killed or seriously injured per 100 million miles driven on their roads.

Roads are kept in the best condition through the council's extensive yearly road resurfacing programme, and our unique 'road safety suggestion programme,' which encourages residents to raise any concerns about road safety, has taken forward 300 schemes in the past five years alone.

Cllr Keith Burrows, Cabinet Member for Planning, Transportation and Recycling, said: "Our local communities and drivers can be reassured from this research that the council prioritises road safety. The council has been consistently ranked in the top two of all London boroughs in terms of road safety for the last six years, and TfL's Transport Commissioner has not only commended our record but wants to learn from Hillingdon's experience. We are committed to maintaining and improving Hillingdon's roads so that they are in the best condition, preventing accidents and ensuring residents' safety."

Partnership work ensures positive discharge figures

Recent national media blaming bed blocking at hospitals on the availability of social care is proving to be untrue for Hillingdon, where joint working between the council and the NHS is seeing low levels of delays.

Challenging targets were set by government last year for Hillingdon to reduce the total number of days patients were delayed in hospital waiting for care to enable them to return home. This was to free up beds for people who really needed to be in hospital for treatment.

Estimates suggest that Hillingdon is performing extremely well and on track to be nearly 3,000 days under the 9,337 day limit set by government.

Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "The council's social care service has worked very closely with the NHS to better understand the issues resulting in delays. The council has further invested in care contracts to ensure providers can recruit and retain staff, strengthening the home care market. As a result of this work, the council is making sure that residents are not unduly delayed and is prioritising their care needs."

Lengthy stays in hospital can have a negative effect, particularly on older people, with many leaving hospital with conditions they did not have on admission. Long stays can impact mental health and wellbeing and lead to the deterioration of bones and muscles. For an 80-year-old, spending 10 days in hospital can lead to the equivalent of 10 years' ageing in their muscles.

Keeping our older residents safe

The council is committed to helping Hillingdon residents stay safe, and ensures that over-65s feel secure and have peace of mind in their own homes through the free burglar alarm scheme and scam protection advice.

Free burglar alarms on offer for over-65s

hanks to the council's free burglar alarm scheme, funded by the Leader's Initiative for Older People, more than 9.000 alarms have been installed across the borough in the last nine years, providing security and reassurance to Hillingdon residents aged 65 and over.

The alarm systems are installed by an experienced specialist contractor and have a solar-powered wireless siren alarm box fitted to the front of the property, a magnetic door sensor, a pet-friendly internal movement sensor and a remote control key fob to operate the alarm. Other alarms are also available for residents who have a hearing impairment.

When an alarm is installed you will be shown how it works and how to operate it. You will also receive a crime prevention pack with information about personal and home security.

Protect yourself from scams

People of all ages can fall victim to scams, but some fraudsters specifically target older people, so it's important to know how best to keep yourself safe at home.

Money

Nobody, including your bank and the police, should ever ask you for your PIN (personal identification number), ask you to withdraw cash as part of a 'fraud investigation' or send



anyone to your home to collect bank cards, cheque books or cash. In such circumstances, please contact your bank directly, using the contact details you already have for them.

Personal details

Remember to keep important personal documents, cheque books and bank cards in a safe and secure place. Don't give personal details (bank or credit card information. passport or driving licence) to anyone you don't know or if you don't know why they need them. If you have old/unwanted personal information, such as old bank statements or cards, cut up and dispose of them securely.

Doorstep callers

When answering your door, consider using a chain or spyhole, or look through a window to check who is calling. If you don't know the person, ask them to show you an identity card or for them to call back another time.



Telephone calls

If you receive a phone call from someone you do not know, ask them for their name and where they are calling from. Never give out your personal, credit card or online account details over the phone, unless you made the call and the phone number came from a trusted source. If you receive a text message or missed call from a number you do not recognise, it is best not to respond (they may charge you premium rates). It's also good to keep a list of emergency numbers by your phone.

Online

If you receive unwanted or suspicious emails, it is best to delete them without opening them. If you



have a computer at home, it is recommended that you install (and keep up-to-date) software that protects your computer from viruses and unwanted programmes.

Leader of the Council and Older People's Champion, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, said: "As you get older, staying safe can become more difficult, especially if you live on your own. We will continue to work with the police and partners to help protect residents across the borough."

Latest phase of town centre improvements completed

Work to revitalise the borough's town centres took another leap forward this spring, with the completion of a series of improvements in West Drayton and Uxbridge and upgrades progressing in Hayes and Eastcote.

he then Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Carol Melvin, officially unveiled a newly refurbished West Drayton Bridge on Thursday 22 March, alongside Cllr Douglas Mills, Cabinet Member for Community. Commerce and Regeneration and local ward councillors.

The bridge has undergone an impressive facelift, including an extensive clean of its concrete pillars and facades and the installation of a specially-designed timeline mural that tells the history of the area from the years 929 to 2019. It has also been given new LED lighting.

The bridge improvements will complement the work taking place at West Drayton Station ahead of the arrival of Élizabeth line services in late 2019.

A number of public realm improvements in Uxbridge town centre have also come to fruition. The forecourt area outside Tesco has been re-configured, with new paving and landscaping, making the area more attractive for shoppers. An intricately designed illuminated sign directing people to our awardwinning Fassnidge Park was installed in Fassnidge Yard in March, and a new children's play structure (right) was also developed.

The £2 million improvement scheme in Uxbridge, which is part-funded by the Mayor of London, will also see better pedestrian lighting in Fassnidge



Yard, as well as new screening and street furniture for Baker's Yard. This work is expected to be completed by summer. A second phase of improvements will then focus further east of the town centre.

Improvements in the Haves Parades, along Uxbridge Road, are also nearing completion. New street lighting, paving, seating and landscaping between Warley Road and Lansbury Close are being installed and footpaths in Craven Close are being upgraded. Eastcote is also benefitting from

more than £1 million of improvements, with 22 shop front improvement grants issued to local independent businesses on Field End Road and new street lighting, furniture, footpaths, signage and planting. Fencing, signage and lighting

at Eastcote Bridge is also being improved. This work, which includes the extensive planting of drainagefriendly rain gardens, is scheduled to be completed in the autumn.

Cllr Mills said: "We are delighted to see our exciting regeneration projects coming to fruition in West Drayton and Uxbridge. I am particularly pleased to see how well the new mural has transformed West Drayton Bridge from a practical but fairly unremarkable piece of architecture to a landmark feature that future generations can be proud of.

"With plenty more still to come across the borough, there can be no doubt that the council is committed to making our town centres nicer places to live, work and visit, while supporting local businesses and buoying the local economy."

Recreational facilities opened

The council celebrated the opening of two new leisure amenities this spring for residents of all ages to enjoy.

A new park for Uxbridge

Dowding Park was officially opened by the Leader of the Council, Ćllr Ray Puddifoot and the then Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Carol Melvin on Saturday 17 March.

Councillors and residents were joined by Lord Dowding's great grandson, Alexander Dowding, (pictured above right) at the opening event, who was pleased and humbled that the park was named after his great grandfather.

Air Chief Marshal Sir Hugh Dowding was one of the Royal Air Force's most significant air officers and served at RAF Uxbridge many times. He developed the UK's air defence system, which protected the nation during World War Two and he picked RĂF Uxbridge as the site for the top secret Battle of Britain Bunker nearby.

Cllr Puddifoot said: "This country will always owe a debt of gratitude to Air Chief Marshal Dowding, and whilst his story is recounted in some detail in our new Battle of Britain Bunker Visitor and Exhibition Centre,

as a council we thought it appropriate that this new park, adjacent to the bunker, should carry his name as a mark of both respect and gratitude for his service to this country."

Dowding Park incorporates 40 acres of rural and recreational parkland and is at the heart of a new community development at St. Andrew's Park, which will offer 1,300 new homes.

Leisure facilities include a football pitch and children's playground, and a trim trail provides an adventurous opportunity for visitors of all ages to further explore the site and improve fitness. Woodland trails and pathways offer an additional way to explore the park, and part of the Celandine Route passes through it. Visitors can also discover the wildlife within the River Pinn from a dipping platform among a copse of mature trees.

In addition, 167 new trees and more than 3,000 new shrubs and herbaceous plants have been planted, and bird boxes, bat boxes and log piles have been installed to provide new habitats for wildlife.

In 2012, the council planted a Jubilee Wood (copse of 100 specimen trees) with help from schoolchildren from across the borough. In 2017, children returned to plant spring bulbs around the base of the trees.



Once building work around the site has been completed, there will be new access routes to the town centre and neighbouring areas.

Adventurous children's play area at Ruislip Lido

A new 18 metre-long wooden children's pirate ship was opened at Ruislip Lido on Saturday 10 March by the then Mayor of Hillingdon, Cllr Carol Melvin.

Families from across the borough attended the event to see the play facility, and Cllr Melvin delivered a pirate-inspired speech.

Children of all ages dressed up as pirates and enjoyed activities, including a pirate-themed storytime and crafts and a treasure hunt in the sand.


The impressive ship offers fun and imaginative play, with climbing rails, play nets, balancing beams, agility areas, a climbing wall and slides. An array of pirate-themed equipment for younger children was installed at the end of May, including small boats, a seesaw, equipment to dig for treasure, a crows nest swing, dolphin springer and friendly fibreglass creatures.

A total of 77,122 people voted in the elections, giving an overall turnout of 38.31 per cent. Eastcote and East Ruislip ward had the highest turnout, with 47.04 per cent of residents having their say.

Your elected councillors have regular contact with constituents, representing residents at a local level and deciding how the council carries out its various activities. During the coming weeks, councillors will be making arrangements to hold surgeries in their wards, so that constituents can meet with them and discuss any council-related matters.





The new interactive displays trace the development of the UK's innovative air defence system and explore the bunker's role during the Battle of Britain and beyond The original plotting table map (the only one in the country) is replicated in the centre with a 360 degree touch screen experience for those unable to descend the steps to the top secret bunker 18 metres underground.

The bunker is a historic landmark of national significance and played a crucial role in the air defence of the United Kingdom throughout World War Two. It was vital in directing RAF operations and was visited by both Winston Churchill and King George VI in 1940.

Daniel Stirland, Senior Curator, said: "Response to the visitor centre so far has been nothing but positive. It is now the only RAF Fighter Command underground bunker open to the public.

"Our new museum finally acknowledges the work carried out at Uxbridge by the people controlling Britain's air defence. Their stories are truly fascinating and more than 85 per cent were women."

Cllr Puddifoot said:

"It is an honour and privilege to be custodians of the Battle of Britain Bunker, which only a few years ago was threatened by closure. We are particularly grateful to the Friends of the No. 11 Group Operations Room who continue to help support us. I must also thank our MP Boris Johnson who championed the council's cause to keep the bunker open, securing £1 million government funding.

"This is an amazing building in both design and content and I need to thank all of our staff and all those involved in the design, construction and fitting out of this exhibition. It is a stunning achievement to see this open just a mere two years after taking responsibility for it from the Ministry of Defence."

Helen Mills, Muriel Broome and Kathleen Thomas, veterans of the bunker (pictured right), were all present at the official opening, reliving their service 70 years after first being based at RAF Uxbridge.

Helen remembered that she felt she had to join up on leaving school at the age of 18. She said: "We had our backs to the wall at the time and I wanted to make a difference." Having been a member of the air corps at school she picked out plotting as her preferred job from a guide of trades in the RAF.

She explained she had the key requirements for the role, which were clear diction and being quick-



witted. "There were all sorts of people doing other things but you only knew the people on your shift. Heaven help you if you got flustered when the plots were coming in thick

and fast. Much better you asked to be relieved than make a mistake," she said. The bunker is open every day between 10am to 4.30pm (except Christmas, Boxing and New Year's Day).



There are a number of event spaces for private hire, including a lecture theatre, meeting rooms and the whole centre. A full range of catering

services is also available, such as canapés and lunch and evening buffets.

celebration event was held on Friday 23 March at the club. which is situated at the Manor Farm site in Ruislip, for members to see the building's transformation. Leader of the Council, Cllr Ray Puddifoot, cut the ribbon on the plaque at the site to officially open the facility.

The clubs' former pavilion, which was more than 40 years old, was no longer fit for purpose, consisting of a small main room, kitchenette, changing rooms and toilets.

Thanks to council investment of more than £200,000, the single storey building has been revitalised by an extension to the east, offering double the space. Care has been taken to ensure that it blends in



in terms of scale and design with the surrounding historic Manor Farm site and Ruislip High Street, which is a conservation area.

The new large clubroom will allow teams to play throughout the year, with ample space for short mat indoor bowls in the winter months.

The room is also ideal for social events for use by the clubs and the local community.

New changing rooms and toilets were added, as well as a kitchen area, storeroom, storage area, locker room, office and disabled toilet and nappy changing facility.

The council extended the original terrace, which provides an important social area for members to chat and watch the games unfold on the green ahead. Two sets of tri-fold doors open out from the main clubroom, maximising the view of the terrace and the green and creating an additional fluid dimension to the social space. The canopy of the original building was extended and new planting beds added.

Ken Scott, Chairman of Ruislip Bowls Club and Kevin Gynn, Chairman of Mill Bowling Club,

said: "The members of Ruislip Bowls Club and Mill Bowling Club are really excited by the prospect of a new home after many years of cramped accommodation. The new clubhouse is well beyond our initial expectations and now offers a yearround excellent facility for members.

"The opportunity to socialise and remain in contact throughout the close season and enjoy many activities together, apart from their first love of bowling, will be a real benefit to all members. We all appreciate the vision and enthusiasm from the council, which has made this possible."

riginally called Ickenham Youth Theatre, the building was completed in the summer of 1968, opened on Sunday 26 October and basic theatre courses began. In December, the first production (three acts and a prologue) was staged - Hans, the Witch and the Gobbin, written by Alan Cullen. The play is a charming fantasy comedy, performed for children by an adult cast, and includes characters Rufus (a king), Daisy (a witch) and Hank and Hunk (two pigs)

Ever since its opening, generations of families have performed, attended and engaged with the arts through the centre's activities and the theatre's audiences have enjoyed regular plays, musicals and pantomimes.

The theatre incorporates a modern auditorium and seating for an audience of up to 158.

It is equipped with a full range of technical facilities, including lights, sound equipment, amplifiers, speakers and a large screen for showing films. Backstage are two dressing rooms, each with showers and toilets, additional

toilet and shower facilities for performers with disabilities and a backstage access lift from ground level to stage level.

Extensive modernisation and refurbishment was carried out in the late 1980s and the new Compass Theatre was officially reopened by Prince Edward on Monday 12 November 1990. In 2016, the foyer and roof of the theatre was fully refurbished with help from the council's Chrysalis programme.

More than 50 volunteers support the theatre in running its busy programme of events. They regularly sell and check tickets and serve behind the bar. Their help is invaluable.

To celebrate its 50th year, Hillingdon Theatres and volunteers are putting on a show on Saturday 1 September at 11am and 3pm with a revival production of Hans, the



Witch and the Gobbin. Tickets cost £6.50 and can be booked on www.hillingdontheatres. uk or by calling 01895 250615. During July, there will also be an exhibition of historic images.

Updates from the Borough Commander

The rise in violence and knife crime nationally and in London has featured significantly in national media. Locally we haven't been immune to the problem and have been working hard to tackle it. This has involved increased enforcement activity in our hotspots, where individuals have been arrested, knives seized, and there has been a greater use of stop and search.

We are also working with the council on a joint approach, particularly intervening early with young people to prevent them being drawn into criminality that can lead to knife carrying. In schools we continue to educate on the dangers, and as parents and guardians, the community has a big role to play in talking to young people, checking coats and bags, and steering young people away from carrying a knife or being involved in crime. This is about everyone coming together to stop knife crime. Please visit our Facebook page or the Met Police website (*www. met.police.uk*) to find out more.

As I've mentioned in previous columns, the structure of borough policing has changed and Hillingdon is now part of the West Area with Hounslow and Ealing. In many ways you will see little change, as neighbourhood, response, investigation and safeguarding teams still remain in the borough, but for the

Met Police this improves how we operate internally and how we work collaboratively across borough boundaries, as we find criminals don't stick to boroughs.

Therefore, this is my last column, as I have now handed over to Chief Superintendent Paul Martin, who is

now responsible for the West Area and I have moved to a new role in Roads and Transport Policing. It has been a genuine privilege to be the Borough Commander in Hillingdon. I have worked with some of the very best police officers and staff in London, always striving to learn and improve in all we do. They are remarkable people who, on your behalf, put themselves in front of danger every day, go the extra mile,

solve crime and lock up criminals. So I sign off knowing I leave Hillingdon residents in very safe hands.

Volunteer for Citizens Advice



illingdon Citizens Advice (HCA) offers residents free, independent, confidential and impartial advice and assistance on a range of topics, including benefits, employment, debt and money, family, health, housing, immigration, consumer affairs and the legal system, to help them with problems and improve policies and practices.

The charitable organisation has worked in partnership with the council since 1994, and also receives grant funding to provide support to residents.

HCA is always looking for voluntary support. Volunteers contribute around 16,000 hours to HCA every year in a variety of roles, including receptionists, assessors, advisers, form fillers, research and campaigning and administration. New positions are being developed for marketing and website review and content management.

You do not need previous experience of working in an advice agency but they will ensure you have an adequate level of numeracy, literacy and spoken English for the role you're interested in. Speakers of community languages are also welcome to apply.

Lucy Oxenham volunteered for HCA for six months as part of a placement scheme at Brunel University.

Changes in how residents can access HCA services

CA operated three offices in the borough in Hayes, Uxbridge and Ruislip.

From Wednesday 23 May, the Ruislip office based on Eastcote Road, which was open for drop-in and appointments for two days a week, closed. This has been replaced with telephone assessments and online bookings for a telephone call-back, available five days a week, followed by a range of options.

For residents in the north of the borough, who may have difficulties using a computer or no computer access, support can also be accessed via libraries, where trained staff can assist customers wanting to book a telephone call-back.

The service at Uxbridge Civic Centre has also been expanded to ensure residents are able to access support via telephone and in person. It's particularly easy to contact the bureau via telephone or by requesting a call-back online, so you don't need to leave the comfort of your home. The HCA website is also set to be updated and relaunched, to provide information on all of the current services and volunteering opportunities on offer.

A telephone assessor will then phone back to make a quick assessment of the enquiry and offer assistance from a range of services. This is a quick and convenient way to access guidance, as the advice line is open five days a week and call-backs are usually made the following day.

If you do not have internet access or need help filling in the form, all libraries in the north of the borough are able to give residents assistance with making an online request for a call-back.
